For whom is this entrance exam?

- The English Language entrance exam is designed to determine the level of English language proficiency needed for admission to the University Medical Faculty for Foreign Students (English Media).
- The program takes into account the requirements for foreign students who speak English on the level necessary for admission to universities in the Russian Federation.



The Examination Form



- Entrance examinations are conducted in the oral form.
- The exam tests English language skills in the following types of speech activity:
 - reading
 - speaking
 - understanding
 - grammar

Skills to be demonstrated

- During the entrance exam an applicant must demonstrate skills in:
- reading, understanding, rendering, answering questions to the text on basic sciences
- understanding speech addressed to them, extracting facts (subject, time, relationship, characteristics of objects, goals, reasons)
- taking part in dialogues on proposed topics, expressing their attitude to the statements of the speakers, formulating own statements based on what they have read or listened to in accordance with the norms of the English language.




Starting the Exam Procedure


Step 1

MTS Link - please, check it even in your Spam folder!







The Starting of the Exam Procedure

When you open this email message click on the blue button



Click the Join button after entering your name and then wait until you are invited to answer on the Exam




Waiting Room




- So, don't panic wait until the examiner will invite you to "go on air"

Identification

 When you appear on air and have greeted the examiner, please, be ready to show your ID with your photo near your face, as well as the room in all around view - you must be alone in the room

The examiner will show you the list with the cards' numbers and you can choose any number.

As soon as you have chosen it, it will be crossed out and **not available** for the other applicants!

 Then you will get the appropriate examination paper for the oral entrance exam that contains 3 sections

The first part is *reading:*

• The applicant shall read the text. The assessment takes into account the applicant's reading (speed and pronunciation), understanding of the text content and vocabulary, the ability to adequately respond to the questions, rendering the text and extracting information from it, formulating own statements based on this text.

Question Card

Task 1. Read, render and answer the questions to the text.

Although they are externally very different, internally, an elephant, a sunflower, and an amoeba are all made of the same building blocks. From the single cells that make up the most basic organisms to the trillions of cells that constitute the complex structure of the human body, each and every living being on Earth is comprised of cells. This idea, part of the cell theory, is one of the central bases of biology. Cell theory also states that cells are the basic functional unit of living organisms and that all cells come from other cells. Although this knowledge is foundational today, scientists did not always know about cells.

The discovery of the cell would not have been possible if not for advancements to the microscope.

Evaluation Criteria for Reading:

- The score for this task ranges up to 40 points:
- Reading (speed and pronunciation) from 6 to 10 points
- Answering the three questions each one *from 6 to 10 points*

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3. What does cell theory state?

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The second part is *speaking:*

- When answering this question we evaluate speech skills and monologue construction skills as well as dialogue skills and abilities.
- The applicant must be able:
- to understand the content of the other person's statements
 - to identify their communicative intentions
 - to respond properly to the remarks
- to initiate a dialogue and express their communicative intentions on one of the *proposed topics*:

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- a) It's half an hour I am here.
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Topics to speak about

- 8. What kind of person should a good doctor be?
- 9. Why did you decide to enter this University?
- 10. What kind of education does a person receive at a University?

- 11. What do students do every day?
- 12. Where do doctors usually work?
- 13. What do you think you need to do to avoid getting sick?
- 14. What time of the year do you like the most? Why?
- 15. At what age do children in your country go to school?
- 16. What do you need to do to be a good student?
- 17. What language is spoken in Russia?
- 18. Which books of Russian writers have you read?
- 19. Why did you choose St.Petersburg for your medical education?
- 20. Have you ever been to St. Petersburg?

Evaluation Criteria for Speaking:

- The maximum score for this task is 50 points:
- Tell about the topic indicated (correspondence of the statement to the subject, scope of the statement) 15-25 points
- Understanding examiner's questions (ability to initiate a dialogue, speech without lexical and grammatical errors) 15-25 points

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a) It's half an hour I am here.				
b) I'm here since half an hour.				

The third part is *grammar*:

- The maximum score for this part is 10 points - you can get 0 or 2 points for each of 5 sentences
- An applicant is offered sentences that contain missing grammatical forms.
- The task is to restore the correct grammatical forms.
